From the Staff

From Katrina Paxson...

Recently I have been reading *The Heart of Christianity: Rediscovering a Life of Faith* by Marcus Borg. In the book, he tackles tough questions, such as, "What does it mean to be a Christian today?" and compares them to what it meant to be a Christian in the past.

One of the first topics he addresses is faith, which, he writes, is "at the heart of Christianity." Borg invites us to look at faith through four lenses, which I would like to share with you.

Faith as Belief: this is believing in something for which you have no proof. This belief is part of the most basic aspect of our faith – the belief in God, Jesus, and the message of the Bible.

Faith as Trust: this is trusting in God like a child trusts an adult who is teaching the child to swim – you must relax and have confidence that the parent is in control. This radical trust should lessen the anxiety we have in our lives.

Faith as Faithfulness: Borg writes that this is an attentiveness to relationship – both with God and with our neighbors. It is being committed.

Faith as a Way of Seeing: this is the worldview we have, whether it is threatening, indifferent, or nourishing. If we practice the other lenses of faith, then hopefully we are viewing the world as nourishing, and we are continually grateful for what we have been given.

My hope is that you will think through these different ways of understanding faith, concentrating on each with its own strengths and difficulties and then the connection between the four lenses.

Bone Marrow Donor Registry

Each year thousands of patients search "Be the Match" registry for a life saving donor. Patients have leukemia, lymphoma, sickle-cell or other life threatening diseases that can be treated or cured by a bone marrow transplant. Only three out of ten patients will find a match in their family. The rest must search the "Be the Match" registry to find one caring stranger who is willing to donate his or her blood cells or bone marrow.

We hope to expand the registry in our area. On February 19 at Immanuel Church of Christ, 2300 Taylorsville Road, from 9:00am until 3:00pm there will be a bake sale and opportunity to add to the National Bone Marrow Registry. To register, donors must be between 18 and 60 years of age and complete a medical consent form. We will have the kits available for signing if you meet the criteria and would like to do so, as well as other information on the process.

Spiritual Formation

The Spiritual Formation Team will create environments to help us grow deeper in our journey of knowing and connecting with God.

Knowing God

Walking the labyrinth is a form of prayer that involves body and spirit. It can be a time of simply opening yourself to the presence of God without any particular agenda in mind, or you may walk with a specific prayer concern for yourself or others or perhaps a question for which you are seeking some guidance. If you have never walked a labyrinth, you may find that it leads you to experience God or know God in a new way.

St. Paul offers an opportunity to walk the labyrinth on the 2nd Wednesday of each month in the gym from 1:00pm to 8:00pm. There are always resources available in the gym to guide you before you walk and help you process the experience afterward. The walk is self-directed at your own pace. The evening walk, starting around 6:45pm, is candlelit and accompanied with meditative music. The Spiritual Formation team invites you to try this ancient Christian spiritual practice on any 2nd Wednesday of the month.



The New Psalms Project

- School children are exposed to live orchestra music as part of the arts in the schools programs here in Louisville.

New Year, New Habits

Keys to Effective Family Nights

Make it Fun!

Enjoy yourself, and let the kids have a ball. They may not remember everything you say, but they will always cherish the times of laughter.

Keep it Simple!

Don't try to create deeply profound lessons. Read short passages of scripture. Try to reinforce your values and beliefs in a simple, easy to understand manner.

Don't Dominate!

If you do all the talking, you've missed the mark. Ask questions, give assignments, invite participation in every way possible. Children will learn more when you involve all of their senses and emotions.

Go with the flow!

Some of the best impression opportunities are completely unplanned and unexpected. It's fine to start with a well defined outline, but don't kill spontaneity by becoming overly structured.

Mix it up!

Don't allow yourself to get into a rut of routine. Use books, games, videos, props, made up stories, songs, music or music videos, or even go on a family outing.

Do it Often!

We tend to find time for the things that are really important. It is best to set aside one evening per week (the same evening if possible) for family night.

Make a Memory!

Find ways to make the lesson stick. Just as advertisers create "jingles" to help us remember their products, it is helpful to create family night "jingles" to remember the main theme—such as "Choose a friend by his fruit, not by his suit" or "Don't be a loser, be a Good Friend Chooser!"

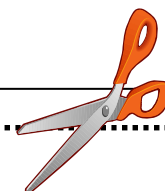
